DEMENTIA AWARENESS

We are a group of students at Oriel High School who are taking action against the life-changing condition of Dementia.

Dementia is a crippling condition affecting no fewer than 850,000 people currently living with Dementia in the UK. This is the same as approx. the whole population of West Sussex living with Dementia.

The rate of sufferers and those affected is increasing and the demand for care is soaring. The average cost of supporting those with Dementia has almost doubled in recent years costing families on average $\pounds I,000$ a week for basic nursing home care.

We are hoping to raise enough money to donate to the Alzheimer's Society who will continue their essential research into tackling the Dementia crisis. We have completed a series of challenges and activities during Dementia Awareness Week (17th-23rd May 2021) to raise awareness of the challenges facing sufferers of Dementia and activities used to support them. Yasmine, Daisy & Evie - ran 5km each day for 5 days to represent the 5 different types of Dementia.

Everyone taking part met a step goal of 850,000 steps to represent the individual sufferers of Dementia.

Macy, Olivia, Shanay & Eleanor - completed a sponsored silence between the hours of 8.30am and 3.45pm for 2 days which meant a total of approx. 209,000 seconds silent, to represent the 209,600 people estimated to develop Dementia this year alone: that's one every 3 minutes. The students' prolonged silence represents the language and communication difficulties experiences as part of Dementia.

Hayden - played classical music on the piano for 70 minutes to represent the 70% of people living in care homes with Dementia in the UK. The playing of classical music is symbolic of the music used in the reminiscence therapies in these care homes for sufferers of the condition.

Mr Clarke - wore the Oriel School uniform for three days. The school uniform is significant as long-term memories are often the last to be affected by Dementia meaning older sufferers of their condition are more likely to remember their school days than their most recent years.

Milly - made purple ribbons to be sold and worn as a symbol of your support for our cause and action against Dementia.

Maisie, Tai, Kirsten & Madena - baked 8 different types of sweet treats. The 4 bakers offering 8 different types of treats represents the 4-8-year average lifespan for someone diagnosed with Dementia (sufferers can live for approx. 20 years after diagnosis). Baking is an activity used to support those with Dementia."















SIXTH FORM FUNDRAISING

Last March, Sixth Form raised over £670 for the Give A Duck Foundation, a small UK charity which supports young children going through chemotherapy. The charity has helped over 2000 children already, supplying them with a soft Chemo Duck fitted with medical lines to help them understand their treatment through play therapy.

The Senior Student Leadership Team held a bake sale and rubber duck adoption day, allowing Sixth Form and Staff to take home their own rubber duck to support the charity.

Will Lingard has also accepted a role as a charity ambassador to the Foundation to support more fundraising events in the future.

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We are delighted to be involved in the AQA Unit Award Scheme. It has enabled us to provide additional support for students, harnessing their interests to create learning opportunities that, in-turn, will support them in and out of school. We have been able to create individual plans for students, providing them with activities they enjoy and unlocking their potential to engage in learning in other areas of the curriculum as well as through weekly Forest School sessions and weekly cooking and gardening club. Through the Awards Scheme we have been able to provide students with engaging activities that motivate them, whilst improving their performance, communication, team work and self-esteem.

The AQA Award Scheme will support students in and out of school, and gives them the chance to celebrate their individual success.

The AQA Unit Award Scheme is invaluable as it is an important pathway for our students to receive accreditation for their achievements. It provides a wide range of units which are differentiated, making accreditation accessible to all students regardless of their ability.

CHICKENWIRED WORKSHOP

On Tuesday 4th May year 7 & 8 students were invited to attend a workshop in the Oriel Youth Wing with visiting artist Will from ChickenWired.

Using just a pair of wire clippers, a pair of bent-nosed pliers and finger-friendly PVC coated chickenwire, the workshops offered students a practical, challenging and thoroughly enjoyable session, creating their own 3D sculpture. The workshop offered practical based activities that encouraged each student to create their own sculpture, following the process from start to finish.

The idea of the workshop was to give students the opportunity to create their own individual sculpture following a simple easy to follow template. The workshop was divided into three different parts; cutting, connecting and creating. Cutting, students used a pair of mini cutters where they cut shapes from a wire sheet as prompted by templates provided. This helped test numeracy and visualisation as the shapes needed to be precisely cut. The templates showed the different patterns of wire and number of pieces that needed to be cut to create each sculpture. **Connect**. Once all pieces were cut, the next part was the connecting. Following the templates, the shapes cut provided the threads needed to connect the different pieces of the sculpture together using the mini bent nosed pliers. Create. Once all pieces

were connected the final stage was to create the sculpture. As the pieces were now connected together the wire could easily be contorted and 'bent' out of shape. Once all pieces were connected, the wire was shaped and manipulated to form the final sculpture.

The final sculptures look amazing! The students really engaged with the workshops with some fantastic results.

REALISE YOUR POTENTIAL PROGRAMME

In January this year, 10 of our Year 10 students were successful in applying to take part in a University of Surrey programme 'Realise Your Potential, the programme aims to raise student's aspiration for future study and career choices. The programme took place over 4 months with students attending weekly Saturday morning online subject workshops, careers webinars and GCSE revision masterclasses in addition to completing a group research and presentation project.

Each student was also assigned a mentor as a key contact to share information and offer advice and support towards achieving their study and future career ambitions. The programme ended with an online Graduation event to celebrate the research and presentations of each student.

The Year 10 Programme is an annual initiative provided by the University of Surrey for students and their supporters to learn more about their options and pathways beyond GCSE study. It is our view that all students should have the opportunity to pursue their aspirations and to realise their potential no matter their personal circumstances or backgrounds. Due to the lockdown, all live events this year took place virtually across a number of Saturday mornings encouraging households to engage and participate in a range of activities such as subject tasters, revision masterclasses, career webinars and a group research project. We were delighted that 117 students completed the programme from schools across Surrey, Sussex, Hampshire and London and congratulate all of the students at Oriel High School who participated since January and presented their research on Saturday 17 April.

These workshops will influence the students with their devising projects where students are given the freedom to create an original piece of theatre exploring social and political issues that interest them. The ideas explored within the workshops will be applied to their own work and help ensure their work is challenging and engaging for their invited audiences later in the summer term.

In the first workshop, Kerry taught students about the political theatre of Bertolt Brecht, ensuring that an audience can see the decisions characters make leading to situations, rather than taking a fatalistic approach to theatre.

Theatre style of Steven Berkoff. They had to push their bodies to create physically and vocally exaggerated characters and scenarios to encourage an audience to think about the extremes in society.

It has been a challenging year for the Arts industry around the world. Theatres have been closed for over a year, and professional actors, theatre companies and workers in the Arts industry have been struggling to adapt to our new reality. It was refreshing and exciting to work with a professional expert in her field to help students move away from online learning into practical work again.



NEW 3G PITCH AT ORIEL HIGH SCHOOL

Harlequins & England international Shaunagh Brown was at Oriel High School recently (Monday 17 May) to officially open the school's new full-size, floodlit third-generation (3G) artificial grass pitch (AGP). The project was made possible thanks to close working with the school's facilities management provider, BAM FM, West Sussex County Council and Crawley Rugby Club.

Shaunagh Brown, who before professional rugby, had a career in athletics, where she represented England in the hammer throw at the 2014 Commonwealth Games, opened the new 3G AGP, the first facility of this type in Crawley. The new pitch will allow Oriel High School to provide students and members of the local community with a safe and secure environment to participate in sport all year round. The school will aim to build on its inclusive ethos to offer competitive rugby and football opportunities to all children, irrespective of ability, and enable pupils to reach their full potential and guide talented individuals into appropriate club and coaching settings.

Strong partnerships are already in place with local grassroots club Crawley Rugby Club who will regularly use the new 3G AGP for training and matches. The club, previous winners of the accolade of National Rugby Club of the Year award, currently run 18 teams and are strongly committed to attracting new participants, particularly amongst girls. This ties in perfectly with the schools future plans.

The school worked in partnership with BAM FM and West Sussex County Council to secure government funding for the new facility. By providing more high-quality facilities, coupled with coaching at the appropriate age group, the school aims to improve the experience for regular players as well as attracting new players to the game of rugby. Having the new state-of-the-art facility, the school aim to strengthen the connection between professional clubs such as Harlequins and their local communities, the growth of girls rugby being a key ambition.

Ryan Sallows, Business Manager, Oriel High School, said:

The new 3G pitch is a huge asset to both the school and local community. It will make a huge difference to grassroots rugby and football in this area. We are very grateful to BAM and West Sussex County Council for supporting our ambitions with this fantastic new facility

Our boys' football teams have been in action since the restrictions on inter-school sport were lifted at the end of March, with each year group playing at least one friendly fixture against Uckfield College, notably, our Year 7 boys won their first school football fixture against this opposition 2-1, with goals from Jeremy Costa and Warren Newman; the Year 9 boys team have also played and beaten Burgess Hill FC and Crawley Town FC UI4s, whilst the Sixth Form boys team have played St Paul's and Buckswood in their summer league, and remain unbeaten at the time of writing.

Extra-curricular summer sports clubs have also been running since the start of the summer term, operating on year group afternoon's (Year 7 – Mondays, Year 8 – Tuesdays, Year 9 – Wednesdays and Year 10 – Thursdays) and we look forward to fixtures for these sports as well as others for both boys and girls after half term, when more schools in the town and county resume playing against other schools.
