

ORIEL HIGH SCHOOL AND LOYOLA SCHOOL SKYPE DEBATE

AS PART OF THE CONNECTING CLASSROOMS PROGRAMME



As we enter into our third year of the Connecting Classrooms Programme our partnership with Loyola School from Jamshedpur in India has flourished. We have begun the curriculum based projects to raise the awareness of global themes within the classroom and seen our students engage face to face with students from Loyola through our Skype debate.

The debate was agreed upon during Loyola School's last visit to Oriel High School in early 2014, it was agreed that a Citizenship based theme would shape a Skype debate. This was done to encourage both schools to work within an agreed set of rules for the debate. The planning of the debate was started by Oriel High School with Loyola School staff members making adjustments where necessary. This collaborative approach meant staff and

students were able to enjoy a well-planned and delivered debate between both schools.

The debate was held at 8:00 a.m. on 20th October 2014 and ran for an hour and a half. The topics were; The poor are to blame for their own poverty (Oriel to disagree), UN Human Rights are a success (Oriel to disagree) and Equal rights for all are not possible (Oriel to agree).

The teams worked well together and the children from both schools were extremely respectful and listened to each other's points. The student's immediate response to the debate was one of enjoyment and the following comments were made shortly after:

During the week 20-24th October 2014 our sixth form RAG (Raising and Giving) students raised £1099.91 for 'Breast Cancer Campaign'. Every October is 'Breast Cancer Awareness Month': the public is encouraged to show their support for the cause by wearing a pink ribbon. Whilst there are many breast cancer charities, 'Breast Cancer Campaign' funds world-class breast cancer research projects in the UK and Ireland. Oriel Sixth Formers ran a RAG week to raise as much money as possible for this wonderful cause, which included a cake sale, selling pink ribbons, and the ever popular wet sponging teachers and sixth formers. Crucially though, this week was not just about raising funds but awareness too. Too often young people perceive themselves as immune from the impact of disease and our students delivered a series of assemblies and workshops to all learning communities, drawing upon the materials provided by their chosen charity and inviting in guest speakers from other charities such as 'Coppafeel'.

The week long RAG extravaganza culminated in male members of staff and sixth formers having their legs and heads shaved all for 'Breast Cancer Campaign'. The first experiment, conducted in the classroom, predictably showed human bacteria could survive and grow in the Martian summer, which at daytime on the equator is not too dissimilar temperature wise to summer in Britain.

The sample which was put in a freezer at minus 50 went into a dormant state and it is possible it could be brought back to life in an incubator.

For their Mars balloon project the girls chose to use a cleaner sample, so they contacted a company which supplies biological specimens and ordered samples of staphylococcus albus, an organism normally found in the human mouth or nose.

Three samples were sealed and sent up in the casings of Kinder egg toys, sitting in a cradle on the balloon, which held 100 experiments from schoolchildren across the country.

The girls are now analysing their samples to see if they survived and grew on the edge of space.

The purpose of the project by Manor Royal-based Thales is to carry out tests that could influence what humans or robots will be doing on Mars in the future.

It is also aimed at getting students to consider careers in the UK space industry.

Charlotte, who lives in Cavel Way, Maidenbower, said: "We have been staying behind after school every Wednesday and sometimes on Thursdays to work on this.

"With most other subjects I wouldn't have stayed behind to do more work but science is really fun."

Alice, who lives in Shaftesbury Road, Maidenbower, added: "There's no limit to the

"If you have an idea and you want to find out something, you can just do it. No one is telling you that you can't do it."

The girls now intend to write up the results of the experiment and create a poster explaining their findings, which will be showcased at this year's Oriel Science Fair.

They will then take it to a national competition in the spring and they intend to take the experiment even further in the future.

Sam said: "Science is fun because instead of being told what to do you can pick which experiments you want to do.

"We wouldn't have done this experiment if we didn't want to. And now we have found out the results we want to go into even more detail."

Over the past half term Key Stage Three Science students have been working tirelessly to research and produce a Science Fair project based on concepts and ideas of their own choosing. On Wednesday 19th November 50 students exhibited their work in the Oriel Science Fair. There were some fantastic projects ranging from investigating the link between hair colour and pain thresholds, a comparison of heart rates when reading a book and watching the same film, and finding the most sustainable fuel for a working steam engine. One particularly innovative project was developed by Benjamin Singer who produced a fully functioning mobile phone app.

On the day the students' projects were judged by scientists from external businesses such Thales and CCG, all of whom were "impressed by the quality and innovation of the work" produced. After much deliberation the following students were the winners:

MATHEMATICS IN ACTION TRIP

In November we took 20 of our top set Mathematicians to the University of London for a series of inspirational lectures about a whole range of Mathematical topics. They discovered the mathematical explanation as to why a falling cat always lands on its' feet and the best way to play Russian Roulette. Pizza was used to show how to calculate the sum of a decreasing sequence, explanations with live demonstrations were given to show how to ensure that a particular person wins pass the parcel. Remarkably, they discovered the science behind the fact that not all wheels had to be round -50p pieces would make perfect wheels! They experienced 'herding' and found out that this peculiar phenomenon was also partly responsible for the Millennium Bridge having to be closed. The speakers were superb and so were our students.

COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT

This term has seen a number of collaborative projects within the community with some fantastic outcomes. We have continued to work with local businesses, community groups and local junior and infant schools through our year 5 maths master classes, volunteering in the Duke of Edinburgh award and creative art workshops linking to the school curriculum.

So what have we been doing...

THE BROOK -REMEMBRANCE POPPIES

The Brook school spent the autumn term learning about World War One in the build up to their whole school Remembrance Service on Tuesday 11th November. Each year group created a different piece of art work to be exhibited during the service. Nursery students made a Remembrance flag, Reception made rag rug poppies, Year I made a large poppy mosaic and in collaboration with Oriel High School the Year 2 students made ceramic poppies inspired by the ones exhibited at the Tower of London.



YEAR 6 MASTER CLASSES

The Mathematics department has been working closely with our local primary schools to support the teaching of Mathematics and promote the subject with students in our feeder schools. We have run four Year 6 master classes where students have explored Problem Solving, Code Breaking and Egyptian Fractions. Many of the attendees had visited Oriel last year for our Year 5 master classes and were very excited to return. Our Year 5 Master Classes kicked off to great enthusiasm this half term with a lesson exploring Logic puzzles.

In addition to students visiting Oriel High School we have visited Milton Mount and Pound Hill lunior School to teach Year 5 and Year 6 children work on fractions and algebra. There are more of these lessons planned for Maidenbower Iunior School and The Oaks Junior School in the new Year.

The first of a series of sessions to support local KS2 teachers with delivering the new curriculum took place at Milton Mount Junior School on the 12th of November and was attended by staff from Three Bridges Junior School and Northgate Junior School. The session was very well received and future sessions at Pound Hill, Maidenbower and The Oaks are taking place and eagerly awaited for 2015.


