2017 marks the third year of the First World War centenary celebrations, especially marking the Passchendaele Campaign, 100 years of service by women in the British Armed Forces as well as still remembering those who have been affected by armed conflict. WHAT IS THE VILLIERS PARK SCHOLARS PROGRAMME?

The Crawley Scholars programme was launched in September 2016, working with students across five schools: Ifield Community College, St Wilfrid's Catholic School, The Holy Trinity CofE Secondary School, Thomas Bennett Community College, and of course Oriel High School. In total, there are seven Scholars programmes across the UK, with the first launching in Hastings & Bexhill in 2009.

The programme is a partnership between Villiers Park and The University of Sussex. Villiers Park is an educational trust based in Foxton, Cambridge. They run a range of courses and programmes that aim to inspire and engage young people to achieve their full potential, whilst raising students' aspirations and attainment. These include the Scholars Programme, INVOLVE, and the Inspiring Excellence Programme (a five day, subject specific residential). The Scholars Programme is unique in that the support students receive is longitudinal and individualised.



a range of courses and programmes that aim to inspire and engage young people to achieve their full potential

Over a four-year period, the Scholars Programme aims to:

- Develop skills and attitudes as well as helping with exam grades these go hand in hand.
- Provide personalised targeted support for each Scholar based on a plan established with their Learning Mentor.
- Improve learning in the everyday classroom for Scholars and their peers, through the work the Advisory Service undertakes in partner schools and colleges.
- · Create academic interest as a result of intensive and challenging masterclasses and workshops that promote a passion for learning.
- Foster social skills through taking part in residential activities with Scholars from the other VP Crawley schools.
- Enhance the school experience by empowering Scholars to enrich the learning community in their schools and colleges through Villiers Park INVOLVE.

The University of Sussex is a research intensive university in Falmer, East Sussex. Sussex works with a large number of partner schools across the South East and London to help support students throughout their educational journey. The Crawley Scholars programme is one of a number of extended programmes that Sussex delivers, as well as providing a range of standalone events and summer schools on campus.




MEET DAN – THE VILLIERS PARK LEARNING MENTOR AT ORIEL

VILLIERS PARK SCHOLARS PROGRAMME LAUNCH

The start of the term saw the annual launch for a new group of Villiers Park Scholars in Year 10 and Year 12. The Scholars visited the University of Sussex for an Information Day, which provided an opportunity to learn more about Villiers Park, and to get to know the other Scholars on the programme.

Both year groups had talks on the core elements of the programme, before going off on a campus tour to get a feel for the university; the Scholars got to see everything from teaching and sports facilities, to the library and accommodation. After a meal in the on-campus restaurant, the Scholars worked in groups to take on a teambuilding challenge.

The Year 10 Scholars were tasked with building the tallest tower possible from a variety of craft materials; the different teams started with varying amounts of materials to work from, and could only gain more through successfully completing additional challenges.

The Year 12 Scholars were asked to construct a bridge where strength, length and stability were all important criteria. Similarly, to the Year 10 Scholars the groups started with varying stocks of resources. In order to make progress, the students had to win money through various activities, with which they could purchase further materials and equipment.

To work well together in their new teams, it was important for the Scholars to communicate effectively, and to assume responsibility for different roles within the group. The changing nature of the task kept everybody on their toes and the teams had to adapt quickly to keep up. Perhaps more than anything else, the Scholars showed resilience when faced with their collapsing towers and bridges! Both days proved very successful, and were a great opportunity for the Oriel scholars to get to know the other Scholars on the programme, who they'll be working with over the coming years.

we offer here at Oriel High School. Our range of activities on offer at the moment range from clubs like Netball, Rugby, Football, Art, Drama, Music, ICT, Gardening and English to name a few. These always run at the end of the normal school day. Please refer to the school website for a current full list of activities on offer this term. Everyone is welcome so come and try something new!

We have also run a range of school trips over the past few years. These generally help to promote

We have also run a range of school trips over the past few years. These generally help to promote and support particular subject areas and help students to understand the content of certain topics more easily with a 'hands-on' approach - although some trips are more for the fun and the thrill of the activities themselves! A great example has been the school ski and snowboard trip to Pila in Italy. Over the last 3 years over 60 students have learnt to ski or snowboard with us! The trip is running again in 2019.

You can see the results of some of these trips and activities on the school Twitter and Instagram account. This is used frequently to give immediate results from sporting fixtures, updates on return times for school trips and also photographs of the students enjoying themselves whilst participating in the activity.

We also provide a huge range of after-school activities that support the curriculum. The SSC (student support centre) provides homework support every evening, and each department in the school provides a range of revision, coursework and general catch-up sessions over the course of the 2-week timetable. On average there are an extra 50 hours of taught sessions after school each week, to help either support students' learning, or enrich their experience of school life.

We also offer 3 days off timetable activities during a week at the end of the summer term. This is hugely successful and is something that all Year 7 to 10 students look forward to. It's a chance for students of different ages to mix and interact whilst learning a new skill or experience whilst out of the school environment. We have a wide range of "in and out of" school activities again this year. We have trips to Barcelona, Disneyland Paris, Tallinn in Estonia, surfing in Newquay, trips to Thorpe Park, Chessington, extreme sports and outdoor and education trips to name a few from the list. It is a huge undertaking to get around 900 students on activities of their choice but we feel so strongly about the benefits of this event that we always try our best to accommodate everyone. We are a proactive and forward-thinking school, and we are always on the lookout for suggestions for new activities, clubs and trips to run. So if you have an idea for an after-school club, or a school trip that you think other students would be interested in then contact me at the school and we will try and make it happen. Most importantly, if you are a student who doesn't stay behind for any of these activities, it might be worth noting that, in our experience, those students who do participate in after-school activities have a much more rewarding experience of school and do better in their final exams. So take these great opportunities and get involved.

- Bedrock Learning teaches students academic language, which is essential for success in all subjects. Year 7, 8 and 9 students should do a minimum of 2 Bedrock lessons at home, each week. For years 10 and 11 there is a GCSE vocabulary quiz.
- · Years 7 and 8 also use Accelerated Reader: students read books, take a quiz at school and get a prize! Accelerated Reader recommends books at the right level for students and also allows their teacher to know how much they are understanding. We expect all Oriel students to read for 20 minutes every day. Parents can logon to check their child's progress against their termly target.


Crawley Lions Club Centennial Legacy Project.
